The month of December marked the completion of two major projects for ARISE.

The ribbon was cut on Monday, December 9, 2019, on a newly renovated building at 635 James Street. Over the past 6 months construction has taken place on all three floors of ARISE's headquarters in Onondaga County. The renovations were made possible through a nearly \$1 million dollar grant from New York State's Nonprofit Infrastructure Capital Investment Program (NICIP).

One long-term benefit ARISE expects to achieve as a result of the renovation project is increased agency capacity to continue to meet the growing needs of the community we serve. A second benefit of the renovation project is the ability to expand existing services and add new ones without placing an additional financial burden on the agency. One new program began in September with the opening of an after-school respite center. The renovation also expanded space for the ARISE Mental Health Clinic.

Then on Friday, December 13, a crowd made its way to Creekside Plaza at 293 State Route 104 East in Oswego to celebrate the move of ARISE's Oswego offices. The new office has 7,800 square feet of renovated space for our critical programs and services, including on-site storage of materials for our vital ramp program and additional space for outpatient mental health services.

Both projects show ARISE's continued commitment to meeting the needs of the communities we serve.

She has cerebral palsy and can often be seen in her electric wheelchair at community functions.
